

Jackie and Jeff Thol were high school sweethearts who married, raised a family and have continually supported their community in ways large and small. Wayne Memorial Hospital has been fortunate enough to benefit from the Thols' skills and generosity.

Over the course of her 26 years at Wayne Memorial Hospital as a registered nurse, Jackie was a familiar face in the Emergency Department, the Operating Room and later, in the Orthopaedic Clinic, commonly called the Cast Care Clinic.

Recently they decided to use Jeff's long working relationship with New York Life Insurance to assist Wayne Memorial Health Foundation. The company will match an agent's contribution to its political action committee with a donation to a charity of the agent's choice. The Thols capped many years of giving to Wayne Memorial by designating the Foundation their matching charity for 2010 and 2011. "This is a way in which I can simultaneously support efforts to improve the economic climate for the life insurance business," said Jeff, "and support our local community hospital."

The Thol's relationship with Wayne Memorial goes back several decades. It is a history of friendships. When their children were growing up and involved in Track & Field/Cross Country, they joined fellow parents, including Cathy and Fred Howell, Diane and Walter Klein, Maurice and Jean Meagher, and Paul and Sandy Meagher, to keep alive the spirit of Dr. William Perkins. They helped launch the annual and still-thriving 5K Perkins Run held at the Wayne County Fairgrounds. And when the hospital initiated its capital campaign, Operation Vital Signs in 2005, friends once again were instrumental in bridging the Thols' big hearts with a worthy cause.

"I have always suggested to my clients that they consider the many wonderful charitable organizations that the community is blessed with, when developing their estate plans," explained Jeff, adding, "I routinely mentioned Wayne Memorial Hospital as a worthy charity and investment in the future of our community. But it was in 2005, during Campaign Operation Vital Signs that our good friend, Cathy Howell, requested that Jackie and I think in bigger terms. We took the advice to heart and made a gift larger than what we had originally considered, in memory and honor of our respective parents."

Jackie's father, John Ward, owned the Hotel Erie in Cochecton, but sold it when he married her mother, a widow with seven children and a dairy farm. Together, they had three children, including Jackie and her sister Marion, who was also a nurse with Wayne Memorial.

Jeff's father was a cashier at Callicoon Bank. His mother operated the Blackhorse Inn near Skinner's Falls.

Both Jackie and Jeff pursued higher education, Jackie at the Binghamton General Hospital School of Nursing and Jeff at Wilkes College in Wilkes Barre. After serving in the Pennsylvania National Guard, Jeff settled down in the local area and opened his insurance business in 1970. He and Jackie have three now-grown children, Nicolette, Eve and Bart, who joined his father's business in 2009.

Once their capital campaign pledge had been met in 2009, the Thols saw that Wayne Memorial's own investment in the community "had grown far beyond the initiatives financed by Operation Vital Signs," said Jeff. Wayne Memorial had created a nursing school program and grown an affiliate, Wayne Memorial Community Health Centers. The Health Centers, subsidized by the federal government, provide medical care to all, including the under-and-uninsured. Since 2007, the Community Health Centers' Together for Health Dental Center has doubled in size and new primary care offices have opened in Honesdale and Waymart.

That's when the Thols decided to tap the New York Life Insurance program for Wayne Memorial Health Foundation. It seemed a perfect match.

Jackie left her work at Wayne Memorial to enjoy retirement, gardening, time with Jeff and their three grandchildren. But her years at Wayne Memorial were not forgotten.

"The days were long," she said fondly, "but they were also meaningful. We went home tired, but fulfilled."

The Thol's gift will help the Foundation fulfill its mission of creating a healthier community. Gifts like this from the private sector are immeasurably important. We are grateful to the Thols, whose thoughtfulness will be long remembered.

Wayne Anesthesiology Group Offers 24/7 Coverage at WMH

TWO VETERAN AREA ANESTHESIOLO-GISTS have signed an agreement with Wayne Memorial Hospital (WMH) to provide coverage around the clock, which hospital officials say will greatly benefit recent expansion of surgical services at the hospital.

Michael A. Kline, MD (right) and Cubyson Oxley, MD, formed Anesthesiology Solution this year to provide anesthesiology services to Wayne Memorial. Both physicians are also members of Northeast Anesthesiology, Inc. which offers services to Regional Hospital of Scranton (formerly Mercy), Moses Taylor Hospital in Scranton and Marian Community Hospital in Carbondale.

Dr. Kline is currently the Director of Anesthesia at Moses Taylor and a staff anesthesiologist at Regional Hospital. Dr. Oxley is Chief Anesthesiologist at Marian Hospital and Vice Chair of the Department of Anesthesia at Moses Taylor Hospital in Scranton.

"We're very pleased to be able to provide services to Wayne Memorial Hospital," said Dr. Kline, "and we're very impressed with Wayne Memorial's EMR (electronic medical records) system. It's a major step forward for a community hospital. Compared to other facilities we work at, Wayne's EMR is exceptional."

Together, the two anesthesiologists have more than a quarter-century of experience in their field. Currently at WMH, they work with two other anesthesiologists and three certified registered nurse-anesthesists.

Elizabeth Korb, RN/nurse-manager of Perioperative and Surgical Services at WMH, said many more procedures—about 500 a year—are being performed in WMH operating rooms than ten years ago.

"In recent years, we have added a third general surgeon and a variety of specialty procedures such as back and spinal surgery with neurosurgeon Dr. Philip Hlavac, balloon sinuplasty with Dr. Philip Liu, many minimally invasive procedures and a host of orthopaedic surgeries with Drs. David Caucci and Jeffrey Mogerman.

Wayne Memorial Opens Hyberbaric Center

"Promotes Wound Healing"

STARTING THIS FALL Wayne Memorial Hospital will offer hyperbaric oxygen therapy, a partnership with Candescent Healing of Rye, New York. Two hi-pressure oxygen chambers have been housed in a new unit adjacent to the Wayne Memorial Regional Wound Care Clinic. Licensed Practical Nurse Lauren Klimek manages the new center, along with trained technicians.

In hyperbaric oxygen therapy, a patient experiences oxygen that is under increased pressure. This has been shown to help the body's natural ability to repair tissue damage—to heal—and prevent possible limb loss. Hyperbaric oxygen therapy may be used to treat diabetic wounds, chronic refractory osteomyelitis, radiation damage, failing or compromised skin grafts, crush injuries, acute peripheral arterial insufficiency and more.
