population. The average age of WMH's 150 Registered Nurses (RNs) is 43. At the same time, as the baby-boom generation reaches its senior years, the need for more nurses is critical.

This fall, WMH signed an agreement to collaborate with Luzerne County Community College (LCCC), a school with a well-established presence in the region and a solid record in graduating nurses who successfully pass state licensure exams. The Wayne Memorial School of Nursing (SON) was born.

LCCC agreed to provide all classroom instruction at local high schools and offer Wayne Memorial students "in-county" tuition rates—about ¼ the cost of most private colleges.

Wayne Memorial, in turn, agreed to hire the clinical instructors and provide instruction in most clinical areas. Some, such as psychiatry, would have to take place elsewhere. The Hospital is also establishing a "smart classroom" to accommodate any needed distance-learning courses.

Student interest in the SON—from high school students to adults such as Michele considering a second career—has been extraordinary from the start. Close to 400 people showed up at informational meetings at area high schools. By this fall, LCCC reported that 60 applications had been received—far surpassing the class size of 36.

Students who complete the two year program graduate with an Associate of Applied Science in Nursing degree (AAS) and are eligible to take the RN licensure exam. WMH is offering tuition reimbursement in return for work and 10 nursing scholarships to qualified students. Chicoski is currently enrolled in pre-requisite courses. If she is accepted, she'll be a member of the very first class in 2010. "I had been thinking about becoming an RN for awhile," adds Michele. "This could be the beginning of a whole new life for me."

Honor, Service

The Memorial Day weekend at Wayne Memorial Hospital was a boom—a 21-gun salute in the form of a ceremony to rededicate the hospital to the memory of soldiers who had died for their country.

The event drew 300 people, many in uniform, wearing medals and carrying banners. It marked the reinstatement of the original dedication of 1955 of their compatriots killed in World War II. The anthem sung by Honesdale High School students, played by fellow students Ricky Korb and...

Emcee Paul Meagher, a former Wayne Memorial Hospital employee, honored to help rededicate the hospital. Mortensen spoke eloquently of the cost of freedom—not the press, gave us freedom of speech, freedom of religion...veterans gave us freedom of assembly.


Afterwards, during lunch, veterans and community members gathered to share stories.

The 90-year history of Wayne Memorial Hospital is one of continuous change, improvement, growth and service to the community. INVESTMENT TIP

A Win-Win for You and Your Community Hospital


When you sell appreciated assets (stocks, bonds, commercial real estate), your investment gains are subject to capital gains tax unless you donate them to a tax-exempt organization. This is a straightforward, easy to implement strategy that offers immediate tax relief, as well as a federal tax saving charitable deduction—and in some cases, the potential of increased income. A gift to the Foundation of one of the above assets held for more than one year is deductible at the current fair market value, with no federal tax on the appreciation, permitting you to make a significant gift while you are living. You'll also be able to observe how your gift makes a difference in your community.

If you are not in a position to make a gift now, perhaps a trust is the answer. You may use cash, securities, or other property to fund a plan that provides you a stream of income for life. For example, if you own stocks that are not paying a dividend, or a low dividend, or bonds that are generating a low rate of interest, or real estate that is earning no income, you may want to consider a Charitable Remainder Trust. You will avoid federal capital gains tax and receive a substantial federal income tax charitable deduction. The Wayne Memorial Health Foundation, a non-profit corporation, serving as the trustee, can sell the assets without incurring any federal tax and, in turn, reinvest the proceeds to secure a higher rate of return. This may allow you to receive a higher income than those same assets generated previously.
